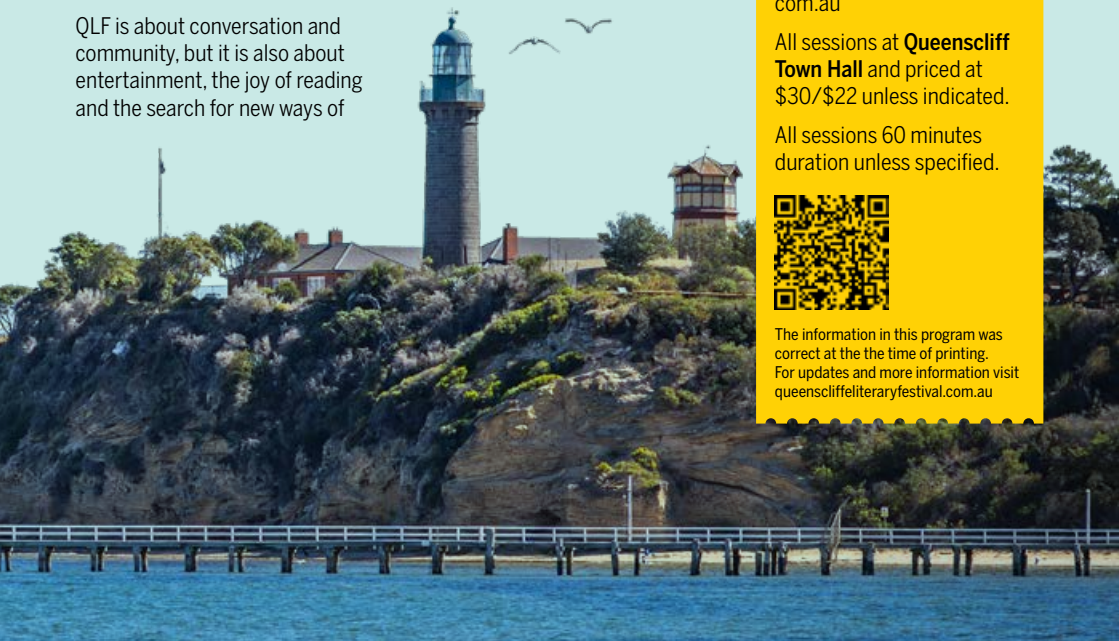

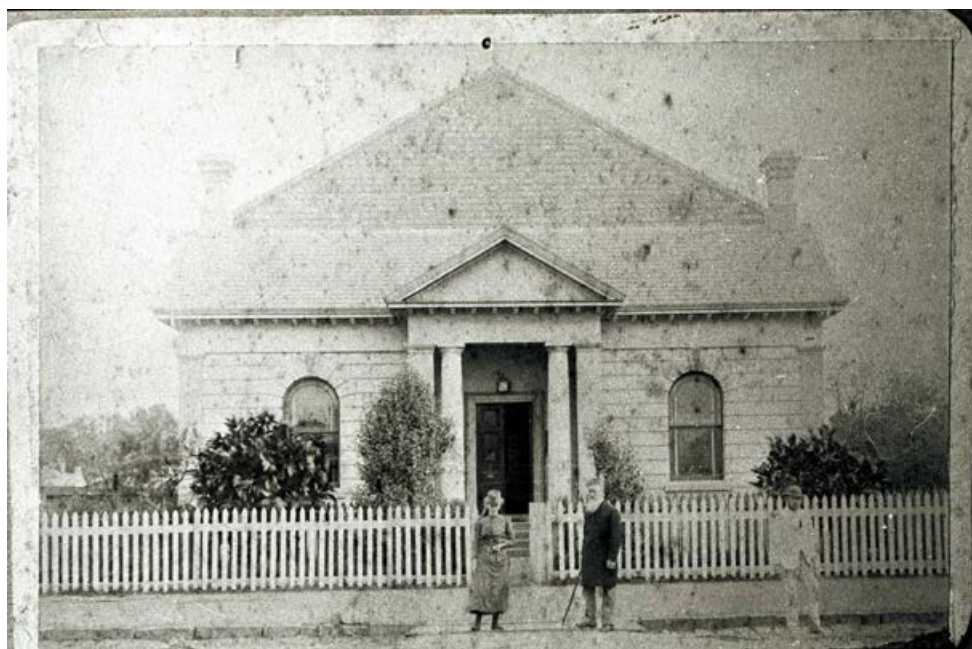
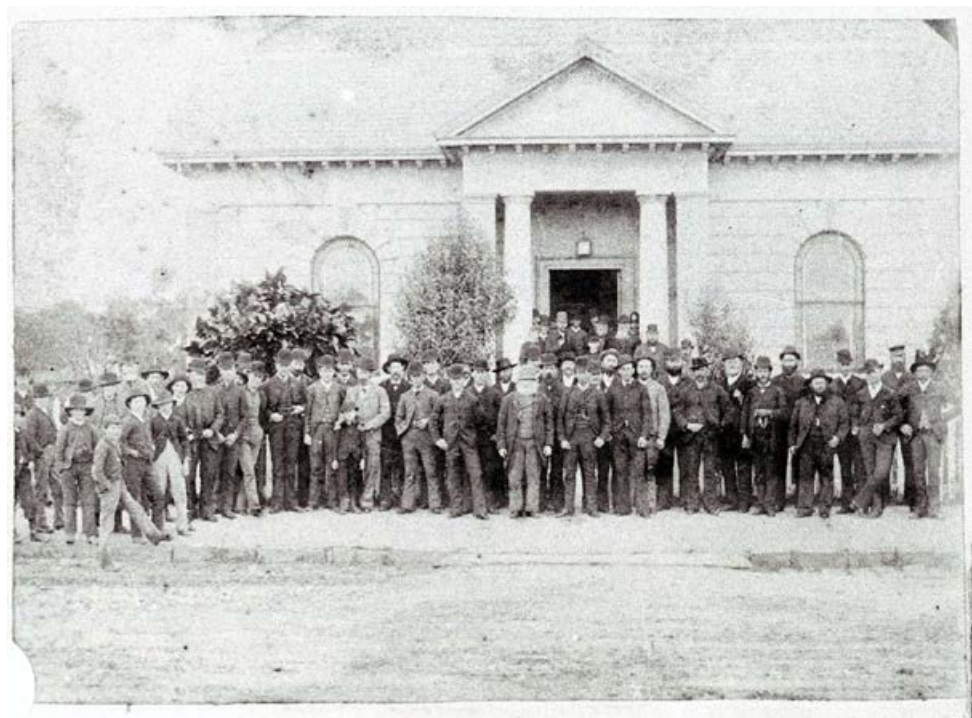

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THE STORY OF QUEENSCLIFF TOWN HALL

Queenscliff Town Hall has a long history as a civic and community institution, and we are thrilled to use this iconic venue as the main location for festival events. Thanks to our partners Queenscliffe Historical Museum for pulling together this brief history.

The current Queenscliff Town Hall was built in 1890 to enlarge the original Foresters Hall of 1870. The original hall served as the only public meeting place in town, and even briefly as the State School until 1877, but had been outgrown by the rapid development of the township after the completion of the railway to Geelong in May 1879 and the gold rush.

The new hall retained the original portico and offices of the original 1870 hall. The opening in October 1890 was a grand occasion. Over 400 attended and the *Queenscliff Sentinel* reported:

'The opening of the New Foresters Hall was celebrated joyously ... with there being few halls in Melbourne equal to our new one. There appeared to be the whole population of Queenscliff present ... when the floor was occupied by those who delight in dance, the view of beauty and fashion was like a glimpse into the wonders of fairy land.'

The new hall accommodated over 600 people and has had many uses over the years, including hosting dances, balls, live theatre, films, concerts, lectures, fairs, vegetable and pot-plant stalls, Salvation Army and council meetings.

The heritage value of the Town Hall lies in its well-preserved English Bond brickwork, slate roof, sandstone sills and decorative glazing, but especially the well-preserved kauri pine floorboards (48mm thick). These were regularly waxed, rather than sanded, and show the patina from 130 years of dancing and foot traffic, with many scars from stiletto heels and 'cupping' of the softer boards from wear!

The Town Hall is part of a delightful heritage streetscape, opposite the original Cobb & Co Stables (1850s) and adjacent eight single-storey terrace houses ('Thanet Cottages', 1883). An upgrade in 2008 provided a new entrance foyer to the hall and modern municipal offices to the south. A new facade, based on a contemporary interpretation of the original Foresters Hall portico and offices, replaced the unsympathetic offices built after the original hall was demolished in 1960.

WHAT ELSE IS ON IN TOWN?



BOOKNECK

Bookneck is a tiny, travelling, second-hand, mini (but mighty!) bookshop on wheels; it is a rolling cultural hub that nurtures literacy, sparks imagination, creates imaginative ways to gather people around books, and spreads the joy of reading. Find Bookneck at various locations across Queenscliff and Point Lonsdale throughout the festival.

ST GEORGE'S FLOWER SHOW

This annual flower show provides the opportunity to mingle in a lovely setting and relive the simplicity of a historical Queenscliff event. There are flower competitions, market stalls, music, face-painting, cake and scone stands, and the much-loved dog show.

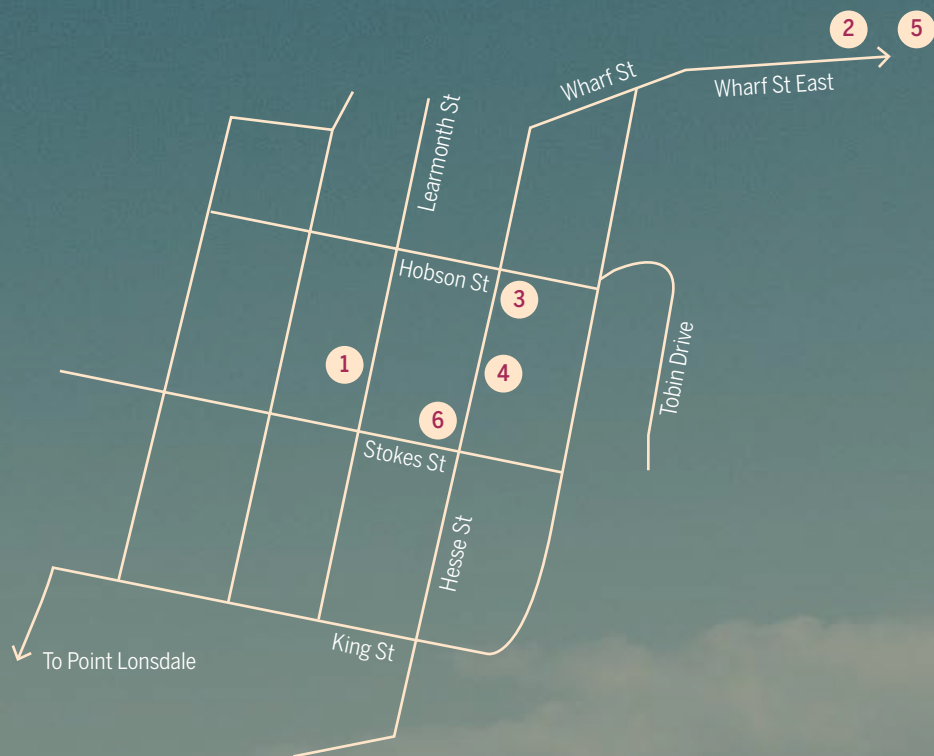
